Message from the Executive Director, Yoshiaki Yamasaki MSEd:

 This report is a snapshot of TPAC/WHCI's programs, and they include: 340 B, Mental Health, Medical Care, Diagnostics for: Chlamydia, Gonorrhea, syphilis, Hep C, HIV, Covid 19 testing.

This report also reflects the impact that consultants, staff, and volunteers have had throughout the years 2019 and 2020.

In response to massive infections of COVID-19 testing sites were established in collaboration with UPENN and Garces Foundation, and more than 300 individuals were tested. It is not until we end the stigma and discrimination associated with testing and vaccination that we can erase the barriers for those who need care, putting an end to the largest pandemic of our time.

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This year, we continued to deliver services through our volunteer program, technical assistance trainings, certification programs, and outreach events. We have expanded our services to include tele counseling services for all, including immigrants and refugees, tele health services, massive food distribution program, distribution of face masks, sanitizer, and other personal protective equipment.

Professional networks and partner sites have sustained and/or increased to include the Mexican Consulate, John Hopkins University, Drexel University, Temple University, UPENN, Philadelphia Department of Health, JFK Behavioral Health Center, Access Matters, Newlands medical center, HIAS, VWSSP, North Philly Pharmacy, Solvency Pharmacy, AVITA Pharmacy, Elwyn Pharmacy, Cardinal Health, Knack, WOAR, Nota Consulting, NSC, Fraser, Chembio, ORASURE, Trinity Tibotech, Arcadia University, CCP, shoprite, Concilio, Congreso, Philadelphia Police Department etc.

For our WHCI partners outside the country, I would like to particularly highlight La Universidad Catolica de Santiago de Chile POL program.

Unfortunately, due to covid 19 our relationship with Robert Moore Memorial Healthcare Center in Liberia for the introduction of HIV rapid testing got postponed. Nevertheless, we continue to be in communication hoping to restart the project soon.

I am proud of our staff, consultants, and volunteers for keeping the doors open throughout the pandemic, truly saving lives including delivering medication and meals to our COVID-19 positive clients.

Here's to another year of serving our local, national, and international communities and making a difference in the lives of those who are in need.



CRiSOL Training - 2 Years in the Making

WHCI began collaborating with Dr. Ana Martinez-Donate and Professor Omar Martinez from Drexel and Temple universities in 2017. The purpose of the collaboration was to connect our community-driven knowledge, experience and trainings to the technical expertise and research capabilities that universities like Drexel, Temple and its students provide. There are currently two studies we are collaborating on with Dr. Martinez-Donate and Professor Martinez. The first is CRiSOL, which stands for Cultivating Resilient and Strong Opinion Leaders. An original Intervention adapted from the CDC and provided by TPAC/WHCI from 2009 to 2014. As a result of this experience the three institutions join forces to create CRISOL. The CRiSOL project adapted once again the curricula to response to the syndemic in the latino communities o of Philadelphia. We trained 16 community leaders to identify and help families, friends and neighbors identify and change traditional social norms and solve problems in their own communities.

Popular Opinion Leader (POL) encourage healthy attitudes and behavioral norms in the community. The POLs were trained to understand the impact of syndemics in Latino communities (i.e. the connections between HIV, mental health, domestic violence and alcohol/drug abuse "SAVAME").

POLS increased their level of awareness of personal resilience and of ways to increase community resilience. They are establishing links with community resources and connecting individuals in need to these resources. They have developed and enhance their skills in communication, leadership, outreach and communitybased research.
